- You will quote the following statement about prayer credited to S. D. Gordon: "The greatest thing anyone can do for God and man is pray. You can do more than pray after you've prayed. But you cannot do more than pray until you've prayed."
- You will discuss the jobs of the priest and the prophet, how they unite in prophetic intercession.
- You will contrast the prayers of mourning or weeping with the prayer of travail.
- You will name at least five ways in which you can plead your case before God.
- You will pray God's promises back to Him, bringing them to His hearing.
- You will bring any promises given through revelation by the Holy Spirit before the Father as a request to remind Him of the not-yet-fulfilled prophetic destiny.

- You will clearly present your understanding of the place of Israel in God’s prophetic schedule.
- You will discuss the two responsibilities God gave man in the Garden of Eden.
- You will discuss the prophet as a public crier.
- You will discuss the relationship between music, intercession and spiritual warfare.
- You will discuss the place of dance, shouting and clapping in praise, worship, intercession and spiritual warfare.
- You will discuss prayer with groaning and travail, its meaning and purpose.
- You will discuss the place of praying in tongues in intercession.
- You will discuss steps you can and must take to exercise wisdom when you become involved in effective intercession

Course Requirements:

1. Carefully listen the *Compassionate Prophetic Intercession* cassettes by Jim Goll as assigned, while following along and taking notes in the related *Study Notes*.
2. Prayerfully read *Kneeling on the Promises* by Jim Goll as assigned. At the end of each chapter is a section entitled “Practical Applications – Making it real!” Prayerfully approach these applications, asking the Lord to show you which ones He wants you to do in order to deepen the truths of the chapter in your life. The amount of time that will be necessary to complete these varies widely. Don’t let that be your criteria for doing an exercise! Take the time to hear from the Lord what He wants to accomplish in your life through this course and this text. Keep a journal of what He leads you to do, how you followed His instructions, and the results you recognized.

There will also be a few specific academic-type questions you are required to answer from this text. These are found at the beginning of the “Application” section of this Student Notebook. File your application journal and your answers to the questions in that section.
3. Prayerfully read *Prophetic Intercession* by Barbara Wentroble as assigned. Answer the “Questions for Consideration” found at the end of each chapter. These questions may require journaling, biblical

Standards for Grading Assignments

Your individual assignments (notebooks, tests, reports) will be graded according to the following standards. These grades will be averaged together to determine your course grade. Remember, CLU is training leaders and leaders are above-average people. Your work will reflect that.

- “D”
 - Indicates barely passing work that is inferior to the average both in quantity and in quality.
 - Manifests a lack of initiative or sense of responsibility or both.
- “C”
 - Average work; either steady work of an acceptable quality, or work of a high quality which is uneven, irregular or fragmentary.
 - May be mechanically or outwardly correct but shows little reflection upon or personal assimilation of the material.
- “B”
 - Intelligently has fulfilled the requirements of this course.
 - Understands the subject matter presented and has applied it to his life in a limited manner but has not really made the truths his own.
- “A”
 - Grasped the material with thoroughness, industry and correctness of detail.
